Key achievements to date:	Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:
<ul> <li>Playground markings updated and providing opportunities for new engagement with physical activity for children through the day.</li> <li>Pupils have physical activity prior to learning in the morning – impact on focus for first Phonics and Spelling lesson. Children noticeably more focused.</li> <li>Forest School OAE has provided a different physical opportunity for learning, which has excited children about the potential of learning outdoors and being physically active in a different way.</li> <li>Use of West Sussex schools partnership provided opportunities for connection for the pupils during Lockdown.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>CPD for all staff to improve teaching of Physical Education</li> <li>Assessment of learning in P.E. lessons – developing format to ensure good progress</li> <li>Development of a P.E. lead to enable ALL pupils to take part in competitive sports: initially within the school community and then beyond.</li> <li>Taking physical activity into the wider curriculum</li> <li>Provision of a wider range of physically active clubs for after school.</li> </ul>
